No content changes have been made simply restated to better align with standards. Rationale: Based on the ICRC courses generally accepted in transfer: ENGL: Writing/Reading – BUT NOT courses designed to prepare students for the first college-level course (ENGL& 100). Acceptable courses are those designed to provide further development in writing and critical or analytical reading skills for students already at the college.

1) new course ENGL 106, Northwest Voices Creative Writing Workshop 2 cr, 22 lec

Rationale: Provides opportunity for students to read works by regional authors. Students will meet these authors when NW Voices brings them to campus, which gives students a more concrete sense that published writing is done by real people. The creative writing workshops will give them a chance to expand upon work that they have begun in the NW Voices writing workshops. Some students will find a 2-credit humanities option useful.

Rationale: We currently offer ENGL 205, Film and Drama Appreciation; however, the class did not fill the last time we offered it. After surveying several student groups, it is apparent that a class focusing mainly on film, rather than both film and drama, would be a much more popular offering (at a ratio of about 8 to 1 in favor of a film-only course). Studying film in winter quarter's ENGL 255, Science Fiction Literature and Film, proved very popular with the students in that class.

Rationale: Delete the health and MATH 089 requirements from the program. Move BUS 104 from a program requirement into the QSR section. This would result in eight credits of QSR instead of five, but it reduced the graduation requirement from 95-96 credits to 91 credits. Students in this program do not work in environments subject to significant occupational hazards or operate any dangerous equipment. As a result, it is not a skill required for employment in the accounting field. The proposal to delete MATH 089 is based upon the professional recommendation of a colleague in the MATH department.
