With increasing numbers of multilingual students entering classrooms across the region, there is a significant shortage of educators equipped to support their academic language development. An ELL endorsement enables teacher candidates to specialize in this high-need area, ensuring that schools can meet both state and federal mandates for providing adequate instruction to English learners.

# **Proposal Items:**

Many local school districts are experiencing a demographic shift, resulting in more students whose first language is not English. Local districts are working to offer effective ELL programs to support student success. By creating an ELL endorsement within our teacher prep program, graduates will be better prepared to serve in these local districts, helping to fill a staffing gap. This alignment strengthens partnerships between the program and local schools, ensuring that teacher candidates are trained to meet real, immediate needs in the field.

An ELL endorsement provides teacher candidates with a specialized skill set, making them more competitive in the job market. As schools seek teachers with expertise in serving diverse learners, those with ELL endorsements will stand out to potential employers. This endorsement enhances graduates' versatility, allowing them to work in various educational settings, from general education to specialized language support roles. By equipping teacher candidates with the tools to meet the needs of multilingual students, the program positions them for long-term career success in an increasingly diverse educational landscape.

This Bachelor of Science in Computer Science program will serve as a bridge between student potential and employer demand, fulfilling Lower Columbia College's mission to empower students and contribute to the economic vitality of the region. Through this program, Lower Columbia College aims to foster a pipeline of skilled, innovative, and adaptable computer science graduates who are ready to drive the future of Washington State's tech industry.

Washington State continues to see a significant demand in the technology sector. Computer Science and Information Technology has been identified as critical areas for workforce development, with a growing gap between the number of qualified graduates and job openings in the sector. Despite the strong industry demand, current programs within the state are not producing enough graduates to meet this demand, creating an ongoing talent shortfall that affects the competitive edge of both established and emerging companies in the region.

In response to this industry need, the Washington State Board for Community and Technical Colleges (SBCTC) has launched multiple initiatives aimed at increasing the number of students prepared for careers in technology. The SBCTC recognizes that accessible, high-quality bachelor's degree programs at community colleges are essential to producing graduates who meet the specific workforce needs of Washington State's technology sector.

Essential skills in automation and instrumentation, including control systems, sensors, and digital interfaces, have become critical for technicians. A dedicated AIIM degree will provide students with the technical proficiency and hands-on experience necessary to meet these updated industry standards. There is a strong labor demand for skilled technicians in automation and industrial maintenance. According to national labor statistics and regional workforce assessments, employers face challenges in recruiting qualified personnel who can install, troubleshoot, and maintain automation systems. These positions offer solid career pathways with competitive wages and room for advancement. An AAS in AIIM will help meet the immediate workforce needs of local and regional employers, preparing students for

Technological advancements, predictive maintenance, and machine learning are transforming how industrial systems are monitored and maintained. Emerging technologies require specialized knowledge of programmable logic controllers (PLCs), human-machine interfaces (HMIs), and remote diagnostics. By offering an AIIM degree, the college will provide students with training on cutting-edge technologies and

high-demand roles in a variety of industries.

- Business Ethics hasn't been taught at LCC since the early 2000s.
   Curriculum was updated to be more relevant and include updated terminology. This can be used as an elective for other degree paths and hopefully lead to a future ethics-based BAS class.
- The question was asked how enrollment is impacted by adding courses does it create competition between classes, ultimately diluting enrollment across classes? Some classes that were retired had not been replaced. Class Schedule development ensures that classes are distributed across guarters/modalities to be optimal for students.
